Fast facts for decision makers

The University of Oregon is a comprehensive public research university that serves its students and the people of Oregon, the nation, and the world through the creation and transfer of knowledge in the liberal arts, the natural and social sciences, and the professions. It is one of only two universities in the greater Pacific Northwest with membership in the prestigious Association of American Universities, an association of 62 leading public and private research universities in the United States and Canada.

The UO is designated by the Carnegie Foundation as a top-tier research university. The UO offers nearly 200 comprehensive academic programs and hosts more than 20 research centers and institutes.

The State Board of Higher Education voted unanimously on June 15, 2012, to appoint Michael R. Gottfredson as the

seventeenth president of the University of Oregon, starting August 1, 2012. He previously served as executive vice chancellor and provost and professor of Criminology, Law and Society at the University of California at Irvine since 2000. His research specializations include the causes of crime and delinquency and the criminal process. His work on the connection between early childhood experiences and delinquency and crime is widely cited (*A General Theory of Crime*).

President Gottfredson is determined that the University of Oregon, one of the nation's premier public research universities, will provide the best possible educational experience to Oregonians and continue to bring the best minds anywhere to the UO, enhancing the quality of life for the state, the nation, and the world.








UNIVERSITY SYSTEM COMPARISONS





Average price for first-time, full-time, in-state students who receive any grant or aid. Source: IPEDS


Avg Net Price for Low-Income Freshmen after Grants, 2010-11


UO State Support per Fundable Student FTE



FUNDRAISING

Private support continues to maintain strong momentum since the completion of the last campaign in 2008. FY2012 resulted in \$107 million in gifts, the fifth consecutive year surpassing the \$100 million threshold. Preparations continue in anticipation of the next major campaign and the campus is eager to increase the level of private giving in support of its core mission of research, teaching and community service.


