Informational Presentation on the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology (UO Charleston)



Establishment of the "UO Coastal Campus" as a Degree-granting Location

Proposal Summary

The University of Oregon (UO) is seeking to convert an existing "other instructional site" in Charleston, OR to an "additional location" and rename it to the "UO Coastal Campus". This requires approval from the UO's accreditors but does not require Board of Trustee approval.

Currently, there are no programs at the location that meet the 50% credit threshold for an "additional location" as defined by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU). Undergraduate students in the Marine Biology major complete 3-4 terms there and the rest of their time in Eugene. The UO plans to partner with the local community college, Southwestern Oregon Community College (SWOCC), to offer more than 50% of the degree at that location such that students could complete the entire degree on the Oregon coast.

SWOCC has indicated it regularly hears from prospective students who are interested in UO's Marine Biology program but would prefer to complete the entire degree at the coastal location. SWOCC is in a unique position to attract in and out of state students for this program because they have student housing available. As a result of these conversations, UO and SWOCC representatives have collaborated to develop a 2+2 degree plan that would allow these students to achieve their goals on the coast. The UO anticipates 3-5 students per year will follow this path based on SWOCC's estimates of interest.

Location Summary

UO Charleston is a University of Oregon site located in Charleston, OR that enables university teaching, research and community engagement, and houses the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology (OIMB). The campus consists of 11 acres of occupied property (more unoccupied) with 25 buildings including research labs, five classrooms, housing (for a maximum of 85 people including dormitories, apartments, and cottages), dining facilities, administrative offices, maintenance and shop facilities, and an auditorium. In addition, the UO's aquarium and museum, the Charleston Marine Life Center, serves the surrounding community and an opportunity for our students to complete internships around marine science education, aquarium science and animal husbandry. Through inter-agency agreements, the campus also accommodates the administrative offices and research laboratories of the South Slough National Estuarine Research Reserve and the Charleston office of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, both frequent partners that supervise UO students in the OIMB internship program.

UO Charleston is situated with 5-10 miles of coastal and marine habitats (rocky intertidal, kelp forests, beaches, salt marshes, mudflats and dunes recreational areas) including the 5K acre South Slough National Estuarine Research Reserve, all used for field trips for our courses and sites for local research. In addition, OIMB has a small remotely operated vehicle, two offshore research vessels, the R/V Pluteus and brand-new R/V Megalopa as well as small boats for working within Coos Bay and South Slough.

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O UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

OIMB has five Tenure Track faculty and two career resident faculty that conduct research (yearround) and teach (primarily in fall and spring terms) at OIMB year-round. During the summer term OIMB has visiting instructors from other institutions (e.g. University of Florida, Western Washington University, Oregon State University) that teach classes. In addition, in the new "People and the Coast Program", faculty teach interdisciplinary courses along with UO instructors from the main campus in Eugene that stay in residence (or commute) to OIMB.

Approval Process

The decision to make this change is the result of ongoing conversations with SWOCC in which they have demonstrated their student interest in the program if we could offer it in this format. These discussions have included the primary advisor and faculty member for Marine Biology at UO, the associate divisional dean of natural sciences in the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) at UO, and the associate vice provost for academic affairs at UO, all in consultation with the CAS dean and the Provost, who have both approved the change. On the SWOCC side, the Dean of Instruction and the Vice President of SWOCC have been the key participants. While the increases in enrollment are modest, the partnership with SWOCC is an important outcome of the change.

Timetable for Implementation

The UO intends to allow students to enter SWOCC in Fall of 2025 under this agreement provided proper accreditation approvals can be obtained in time. The UO is also prepared to delay until Fall 2026 if necessary. Given the change in status will not require operational changes or the addition of new resources in Charleston, a long lead time to prepare for the change is unnecessary.

Resources

The site currently has sufficient capacity to absorb the modest additional enrollments expected by this change. Those additional students will join students from the Eugene campus in courses and facilities that already exists and will add no additional operational costs.

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
