### **University Senate Report to the Board of Trustees**

### **Past and Current Business**

### **EXPEDITED TENURE PROCESS**

Provost Banavar approached Senate leadership this fall with the desire to establish a process by which individuals could be hired at the full professor level with tenure in an expedited manner. This was seen as necessary to recruit extremely qualified senior faculty who might want the assurances of tenure before accepting a faculty position at UO. The initial proposal was written by the Faculty Personnel Committee in conjunction with the Provost's office and refined through the legislative process in the Senate. The motion establishing the committee was ultimately passed unanimously by the Senate and provides an expedited process which has multiple layers of faculty oversight.

### RESOLUTION CONDEMNING WHITE SUPREMACY

The Senate passed a resolution "Denouncing White Supremacy & Hate Speech on Campus" at https://goo.gl/FwhsJ6 .

### STATEWIDE FOUNDATIONAL CURRICULUM ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

In response to HB2998, the HECC commissioned the HECC Transfer Workgroup to determine articulation of a foundational curriculum between public colleges and universities in Oregon. The chair of the University Committee on Courses and Academic Council, Frances White, was the chair of the Foundational Curricula Subgroup and presented learning outcomes and assessment criteria for the main categories of courses in our general education requirements (Composition, Arts & Letters, Natural Sciences and Social Sciences). The Senate approved these learning outcomes and assessment criteria in January.

### **CORE ED COUNCIL**

The Senate is currently working on the charge and membership of the Core Education Council—the faculty body which will be responsible for suggesting changes/innovations to our general education programs. We anticipate the legislation impaneling this committee will be passed this quarter, and the committee should convene during the next academic year (after the usual cycle of elections/appointments done yearly in spring).

### **CONSENT CALENDAR**

The Senate instituted a consent calendar to allow for legislative efficiency. The Senate is an important part of the policy approval process, but not all policy changes need to have a full hearing on the floor of the Senate. We instituted a consent calendar to allow for uncontroversial issues to be approved by the Senate without debate.

### NORTH CAMPUS/RIVERFRONT

A group of faculty has brought an objection to the current proposal to the city of Eugene from the university, for a conditional use permit for the area of campus north of Franklin Blvd and south of the Willamette River. They plan to ask the university, via resolution, to consider educational/ecological options for the land.

### **Upcoming Business:**

### STUDENT EVALUATIONS

The Senate Student Evaluation Task Force is looking into the problem of bias and bad incentives for good teaching in our current student evaluations of teaching, which are well documented in peer-reviewed research. They are proposing a more holistic approach to evaluations which incentivize high impact teaching practices, and which provide a mechanism for students to help instructors improve their courses. The Task Force is sensitive to the fact that student evaluations are used for promotion, tenure decisions and merit raises, and provide an important opportunity for students to give feedback on their courses. The Task Force will propose a new system which maintains the ability to evaluated teaching quality.

### MISSION DRIVEN LEARNING OUTCOMES

To appease our accreditors we need to demonstrate that our general education program teaches to the mission statement of the university. We will be approving mission-centric learning outcomes and assessment criteria for general education courses. New courses (and those up for re-approval) will need to include learning outcomes and assessment criteria for at least two of the mission-centric outcome categories. We are proposing that these categories be: written communication, ethical reasoning, critical thinking and creative thinking.

### **MULTICULTURAL REQUIREMENT**

Several groups of faculty have been working on proposed changes to the multicultural requirement. Currently, undergraduates are required to take two courses from two of three multi-cultural categories: International Cultures, American Cultures and Identity, Pluralism & Tolerance. The proposed change will fold the Identity, Pluralism & Tolerance courses in with the other two categories, and students will be required to take one course in each of International Cultures and US Cultures. There is some question of what is to be done with course which currently satisfy the Identity, Plu-

ralism & Tolerance category, and it will take some political maneuvering to address the concerns of faculty teaching those courses. I hope that we will get to this topic this year, but changing requirements (and especially eliminating categories) can be politically tricky, so this may get pushed back until next year when Bill Harbaugh will have to deal with it.

### **GEN ED REQUIREMENT SIMPLIFICATION**

Currently the group-satisfying requirements (Natural Sciences, Social Sciences and Arts & Letters) have the following restrictions:

A minimum of 15 credits in approved group-satisfying courses is required in each group.\* Each group must include:

(a) at least two courses in one subject and

(b) at least one course in a different subject.

Total Minimum Credits: 45 (no more than 3 courses from one subject)

All degrees: No more than one course within the same subject code of the major.

These restrictions are seen as cumbersome for students and so we propose (and hope the Senate will approve) a simplification along the lines of: Each group must include courses in at least two subject codes.

### **GEN ED CREDIT FOR ARC COLLOQUIA**

We have been working with VPs Doneka Scott and Ron Bramhall to innovate first-year programs with the goal of having all traditional freshman participate in such high-impact programs. For now, in order to incentivize participation, we are proposing that the colloquia associated to Academic Residential Communities (thematic blocks of courses with cohort living) be allowed to satisfy group requirements for general education. This will ameliorate the concern of students and parents that these colloquia are 'lost' credit that does not contribute to degree requirements. (In fact, since we demand a certain number of elective credits this impression is false, but we would like to replace what is seen as a disincentive with an actual incentive for participating in these programs).

### **General Updates -**

To begin winter term, my Executive Cabinet and I had the opportunity to go on a leadership retreat before the start of classes. We were able to use our weekend together to strengthen our team, plan our calendar for the year, and get a head-start on the projects and events that we wanted to accomplish by spring break and through the rest of the school year.

The survey campaign was incredibly successful! We received more responses than expected and exceeded our goal by over 1000 responses.

The ASUO Executive, Senate and other students from the University of Oregon participated in two main lobby days in Oregon's capitol, Salem. Our team participated in the Oregon Student Association (OSA) lobby day in the beginning of February, working toward advocating for funding for higher education. Most recently, a group of ASUO leaders participated in University Lobby Day, working with students, faculty, and staff from the six other public universities to thank our legislators for funding higher education and urge them to do so this upcoming biennium.

### Campaign Updates -

### Food Security -

We recently partnered with the Oregon Hunger Task Force to hold an event titled "Hunger on Campus." It was the first Food Security Listening session held on the University of Oregon campus. We held this event in order to take an in-depth look at food insecurity on college and university campuses, with an emphasis on the University of Oregon. It was an opportunity for students, staff, and other members of the campus community to listen to speakers and discuss food security issues in



Oregon. We were lucky enough to have experts from other schools around the state attend and present at the event. The day began with panels about food insecurity at the University of Oregon and the best practices for addressing hunger on campus. After lunch, there was a workshop in which attendees could plan ways to address campus food insecurity. Overall, there was great turnout with over 100 people attending throughout the day.

In addition to events, the ASUO has been working diligently to set up and utilize task forces regarding aspects of Food Security at UO. This term, our four task forces (Food Pantry, On Campus Dining, Fundraising, and Food Drive) were able to meet individually as well as in a large collaborative setting. These meetings have been productive in organizing current campus efforts and bringing in leaders of food security from around the UO to help foster new ideas and visions for food security efforts. More specifically, our On-Campus Dining Task Force has been working to develop pools of money for students to pull from for food security. The Food Drive task force, lead by the student Alex Hunt-Riley, has been doing an amazing job spreading awareness around our on-campus food drive by partnering with Food for Lane County and working to establish food donations and chocolate sales. Additionally, both the Food Pantry and Fundraising Task Forces have conducted research on the options for a physical location and plan on establishing a food subsidy fund at the University level to continue Food Security efforts.

Our Organizing Director has worked hard to hold Quack Wraps each weekend. Currently, they are able to hand out 50 burritos on Saturdays and Sundays, for a total of 100 burritos to students each weekend. They are currently working on expanding their marketing throughout the campus community in order to reach more students in need.



### Tuition and Affordability -

Throughout this term, ASUO External Vice President Vickie Gimm, our ASUO State Affairs Commissioner Imani Dorsey, and I have all served on the Tuition and Fees Advisory Board (TFAB) and attended all budget meetings this term. We have worked alongside the members of TFAB to come brainstorm tuition options and the future of the budget in the years to come. While we have not been able to establish TFAB guidelines for the functioning of TFAB, due to timing issues, I hope that we are able to complete those this term to install for the next years' tuition process.

In order to make information and updates about the tuition-setting process more accessible, we worked with a graphic designer to develop one-page flyers that summarized the most important points of each TFAB meeting. These flyers were sent to student groups and posted outside the ASUO office for anyone interested in viewing them weekly.

We held three forums along with TFAB, where any students were invited to come and meet the members of the board, ask questions and learn about the tuition-setting process. Two of these forums were held prior to the creation of the tuition recommendation, and one was held mid-February after the tuition recommendation was sent to the Provost.

Additionally, I wanted to include a small piece in this section about my thoughts on the current tuition proposal. I recognize that while I still sat on TFAB this year, I condemn the tuition increase proposed. While it is difficult with the financial strains of the University to find alternative funding solutions, I want to urge you, the Board of Trustees, as I have urged TFAB to a multiplicity of times to do, to find alternative solutions to a tuition increase, and get to a point that tuition is not the only tangible solution to our funding situation.



I want to express my deepest concerns with the differential tuition proposal proposed by the Lundquist College of Business (LCB). Even after listening to the rationale, I still stand opposed to this proposal for a variety of reasons. Many of the reasons are outlined throughout the tuition proposal submitted to you all, but I want the opportunity to elaborate on a few points. When this differential tuition increase was researched, only 35 students were surveyed about their thoughts on the increase by the LCB. While it is commendable that an effort was made to reach out to students, 35 students do not provide a holistic look on the true impact a proposal like this could have on current and potential LCB students. Additionally, I believe we as a University need to set a policy before implementing a differential tuition proposal. Before the Boards of Trustees were created around the state of Oregon, the Oregon University System (OUS), had a detailed policy that laid out the process of implementation for differential tuition. This policy required thorough student consultation. Without a similar policy at the UO, moving forward with this proposal would be inequitable and unjust because any differential tuition decision needs to be an institutional conversation, with students at the table.

### Transparency -

The ASUO Internal Vice President, Tess Mor, is working closely with our Oregon Student Association UO Campus Organizer to meet with professors and find time to share short presentations that briefly explain what the ASUO is, how ASUO manages student dollars, and ways that interested students can get involved with student government. We are also developing infographics to share on social media and at tables around the EMU.

Our Communications Director has been helping the reporter at the Daily Emerald better understand ASUO's structure so that he can confidently write stories about the ASUO. Overall, we have a strong working relationship with campus publications that we expect to continue throughout the school year.

### **ASUO Budget -**

After budget reconfiguring, the Incidental Fee has increased by 5% the next academic year 2018-2019. The new I-Fee amount will be \$250.50, maintaining current service cost levels for necessary services for students.

### **Events and Conferences -**

This spring, we will be holding another Street Faire! Our Special Events Coordinator has already released an application for local businesses to register a space. She has also come up with ideas to make the Street Faire more interactive, including a beer garden, or outdoor seating and music to draw a larger crowd.

Additionally, the ASUO will be sending a large delegation of leaders to attend the Oregon Student Association's annual Northwest Student Leadership Conference (NWLSC) in late February. This conference, held in Portland, will be a great time to provide skills and training to up and coming student leaders on the UO campus while encouraging their participation in student advocacy throughout the rest of their time at the University.

### **AY2018-19 TUITION AND FEES**



### **Overview of Requested Authorization**

Note regarding packet materials: Provided in this packet are (i) this summary, (ii) a memo from President Schill outlining his final recommendation, (iii) initial slides with comparator information (full slide deck provided closer to the meeting), (iv) the resolution, (v) Exhibit A – tuition and fee tables, (vi) Exhibit B, redlined tuition and fee policy book, and (vii) a 10-year history of the i-Fee. The TFAB memo, provided last week, is available via hyperlink below.

Each year, the president presents to the board a recommendation for tuition and mandatory fees for the following academic year. Below is a summary of the president's recommendation for academic year 2018-19 (AY18-19) for tuition and fees. The resolution before the Board also includes authorization of the associated "Tuition and Fee Policy Book", which articulates the purpose of and use for tuition and fees.

### **PROCESS RECAP**

The Tuition and Fee Advisory Board (TFAB) exists to advise the provost and president on tuition, mandatory fees, course fees, other significant costs of education, as well as issues related to tuition structure (e.g., differential tuition). TFAB does not vote on a specific recommendation. Information related to TFAB meetings, materials, and background information is posted on the university's tuition and institutional research websites, and all meetings are open to the public.

Between October 2017 and February 2018, the TFAB met eight times. In addition to its meetings, TFAB—with the help of ASUO—held two student tuition forums, one in January and one in February during which students could learn more about the tuition setting-process, ask questions and offer input.

After its meetings and forums, TFAB co-chairs take all information and advice into consideration and a memo is generated by this advisory group and submitted to the provost. The provost shared this memo with the broader community, soliciting online feedback. He also held a third student forum in early February where he was able to listen to concerns, ideas and questions from students. The provost conferred with the president, who in turn put forth a proposal for additional public comment before submitting his final recommendation to trustees.

The TFAB is co-chaired by Jamie Moffitt, vice president for finance and administration and CFO, and Brad Shelton, executive vice provost for academic operations. Its membership included students, faculty, deans, vice presidents, vice provosts, and other administrative staff engaged in budgeting, institutional research and financial aid.

### **ANTICIPATED COST INCREASES**

The following is a <u>non-exhaustive</u> list of known and anticipated cost increases considered by the TFAB. These reflect recurring cost drivers that will be added to the UO's Education and General ("E&G") budget. There are certainly other cost increases, such as those which might be found in individual schools or colleges; this list focuses on high-level, major institutional increases.

### **CAMPUS GROWTH**

The current enrollment management target for the AY19 entering freshman class is 4,150, which would be an increase of 300 students from fall 2017. If successful, this growth is expected to generate approximately \$6.6 million of net revenue growth. This revenue could indeed offset some current and future cost increases. TFAB's recommended rates assumed total net revenue of somewhere between \$4.0 and \$5.5 million, allowing for some room within the total goal. There is inherent risk in setting AY19 tuition rates based on this goal, but President Schill agreed that, at this time, it was prudent to use a slightly lower estimate while waiting to assess the UO's success toward the goal.

### **PERS SMOOTHING**

While the university is not facing PERS increases in FY19, the university expects significant increases in both FY20 and FY22. The PERS Board has released the PERS rates for FY20 that would result in the UO's E&G fund retirement costs increasing by approximately \$8.9 million (recurring annual as an increase to the base), and FY22 is likely to be similar. A question TFAB considered was whether to attempt to "smooth" the impact of these future increase over multiple years. TFAB members supported the idea of looking at future PERS cost increases when discussing how much to increase tuition in the coming year. In their discussions they specifically targeted \$2.45 million as the amount of future retirement costs that they would like to "cover" in the coming year. \$2.45 million was calculated by looking at the difference between expected PERS costs and expected growth revenue over the next few years. The final TFAB tuition recommendation, however, will not generate enough revenue to cover all of next year's costs plus the \$2.45 million of retirement costs. While TFAB felt that it was important to try and cover all of these costs, they did not think that it should be done entirely through the undergraduate rate increase. Instead they suggested that other revenue streams or savings initiatives should be pursued. While President Schill also thinks that it would be prudent to start to "smooth" the impact of PERS increases over many years, given the uncertainty related to enrollment growth for next year, he is not recommending that the undergraduate tuition rates be increased further for next year. President Schill's recommendation before you follows this guidance from the advisory board.

### **DIFFERENTIAL TUITION**

There are two issues relating to differential tuition in this year's recommendation from President Schill.

First is the establishment of a \$20 per credit hour differential tuition rate for undergraduate courses within the Lundquist College of Business.<sup>2</sup> It is important to note that TFAB had a very mixed reaction to the proposal. Some committee members were supportive and others were opposed. An articulation of the respective arguments is available in the TFAB memo referenced on page 1. President Schill's recommendation includes this increase, but calls for 20% of the revenue generated from this differential to be permanently set aside for financial aid targeted on the basis of need for students paying the

differential. The PathwayOregon program will cover the increase for participating students. This differential would raise an estimated \$1.4 million of net revenue for instruction, advising, tutoring and career services at the college. This is deemed necessary to meet growing demand, boost tenure-track faculty numbers, and meet certain goals important to accreditation and quality education.

Second is a reduction in the current differential tuition charged to students in the Clark Honors College. Currently, this differential is \$4,194 per year (three terms), which is among the highest in the country. The UO's strategic budget advisory group recommended we use funds from the strategic investment process to reduce the differential tuition charged to Honors College students. The proposed reduction takes the differential down to \$2,700 per year, a 35.6% reduction. This will make the Honors College more accessible and more competitive.

### **AY 2018-19 TUITION AND FEE RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY**

For a detailed list of the proposed AY18-19 tuition and fee tables, please see Exhibit A to the resolution. Per standard practice, 10% of the gross tuition funds generated will be used for fee remissions (scholarships) for students, notwithstanding the 20% rate applied to the LCB differential as explained above.

- <u>Undergraduate resident tuition</u> would rise \$6 (2.84%) per student credit hour (SCH), from \$211 per SCH to \$217. This increases annual (academic year) tuition for a full-time student to \$9,765 (\$270 increase).
- <u>Undergraduate non-resident tuition</u> would rise \$18 per SCH (2.49%) from \$723 per SCH to \$741 per SCH. This increases total annual (academic year) tuition for a full-time student to \$33,345 (\$810 increase).
- <u>The Honors College differential</u> is proposed for a 35.6% decrease, lowering the annual (academic year) differential from \$4,194 to \$2,700.
- <u>Differential tuition is proposed for courses in the Lindquist College of Business.</u> The per-SCH differential fee will be \$20. Twenty percent of this would be set aside for aid and remissions.
- <u>Summer undergraduate tuition rates</u> increase by the same percentage (to the nearest whole dollar) as academic year tuition increases. The rate increases in question will go into effect summer 2019.
- <u>Graduate tuition</u> varies by degree level and school/college. The year-over-year changes range from a 0% increase to a 4.6% increase with two exceptions. Full detail is in Exhibit A.
  - The College of Design is restructuring tuition for many graduate programs to more specifically charge tuition appropriate for fields based on market data. In some cases, this will dramatically lower tuition and it others it will significantly increase tuition rates.
  - The School of Journalism and Communication proposed an increase for two programs of
     6.1% Strategic Communications and Multimedia.
- Mandatory fees would see a 2.75% increase per term (2.69% for law). This comes from two places:
  - A \$7 proposed increase per term for the health services fee to help cover additional demand and rising health-related costs. This is 3.66%, from \$191 to \$198 per term.
  - The ASUO proposes a 5.0% increase (\$12) in the student-managed Incidental Fee (aka "I-Fee").
- <u>Establishing new mandatory fee rates for Portland, OIMB and off-campus:</u> Because students who
  are not on the UO's campus use services quite differently than students in Eugene, there is a
  proposed mandatory fee structure for students in Portland, at OIMB on the coast, and generally
  off-campus.
  - These students would pay the mandatory building fee and technology fee in whole.
  - o They would pay one-half of the I-Fee.

o For the health fee, students at OIMB would pay the normal health services fee, students in Portland would pay the Portland State health services fee, and students entirely off-campus would pay no health services fee.

### **TUITION AND FEE POLICY BOOK**

Part of the resolution is adoption of the 2018-19 version of the University of Oregon Fee Book. This book articulates policies relating to various university fees, tuition discounts (e.g. employee), and the like. A redline version of the Fee Book is attached to the resolution as Exhibit B so that you can review any changes. Please note that most of the changes proposed in this Fee Book revision are meant to improve clarity and specificity from the last version. Sections without redlines are redacted in this packet, but a full copy of the current (FY17-18) fee book is available online (<a href="http://policies.uoregon.edu">http://policies.uoregon.edu</a>) or by request.

RE: Academic Year 2018–19 Tuition and Fee Proposal

Enclosed is my tuition and fee proposal for the 2018–19 academic year, which is largely the same as the conditional recommendation I issued on Friday, February 16. In making this proposal, I reviewed the Tuition and Fee Advisory Board (TFAB) recommendation, consulted with Provost Jayanth Banavar, read stakeholder online feedback, reviewed notes from several TFAB forums, discussed tuition issues with the Associated Students Presidential Advisory Council, and listened to students at a recent tuition forum.

My proposal for undergraduate tuition rate increases aligns with the TFAB's recommendation. This includes a 2.84 percent increase for resident undergraduate students and a 2.49 percent increase for nonresident undergraduate students. For resident students, this represents an increase of \$6 per credit, or \$270 per year. Nonresident undergraduate students would see tuition rise by \$18 per credit, or \$810 annually. I propose the same mandatory fee structure recommended by TFAB, which leaves most mandatory fees the same, but includes a \$7 increase in the student health center service fee, which will support expanded health and counseling services for students.

This tuition plan ensures that Oregonians have access to an affordable education at one of the nation's top research institutions. In addition, the proposed tuition level will provide budgetary support to invest in new tenure-track faculty lines, make more than \$2 million in strategic investments across campus, and uphold our compensation and benefit obligations to the UO's dedicated faculty and staff.

It is important to recognize, however, that our budget remains vulnerable to unexpected fluctuations, including changes in enrollment, economic conditions, and state appropriations. Because of this budget fluidity, adopting this tuition level is something of a risk, and we could find ourselves having to seek additional revenue sources or cost reductions to meet the UO's fiscal obligations. Nevertheless, in this era of rapidly increasing education costs, I believe that risk is worth taking.

Further, I recommend that the UO adopt a differential tuition plan for the Charles H. Lundquist College of Business. Under the proposal, students would be charged an additional \$20 per

credit for undergraduate courses taken in the business school. This would generate an estimated \$1.4 million of net revenue annually for instruction, advising, tutoring, and career services at the college.

This type of tuition structure is similar to other schools in Oregon and among peer institutions in the Pac-12 and the Association of American Universities. Not having the resources from differential tuition places the Lundquist College at a competitive disadvantage and could, ultimately, threaten its accreditation. For that reason, I recommend the Board of Trustees adopt this proposal for differential tuition.

At the same time, I recognize that even a modest tuition increase can be challenging for some, and we will work to ensure that the impact of this differential is not prohibitive to our most vulnerable students and their families. Therefore, my proposal includes a plan to permanently set aside 20 percent of the revenues generated by the differential tuition for need-based financial aid for students who pay the differential tuition. The PathwayOregon program will continue to provide full tuition and fees to all academically qualified, Pell Grant–eligible resident students who start as freshmen on our campus. In fact, one-third of in-state freshman students receive the PathwayOregon benefit already, and we are committed to the growth of this program so that the doors of opportunity are open to Oregon's best and brightest students regardless of their financial situation.

In addition to these recommendations, I am pleased to propose a reduction in the tuition differential for the Robert Donald Clark Honors College. Currently, the honors college has a tuition differential of \$4,194 per year, which is among the highest in the country. A strategic budget advisory group comprising students, administrators, and members of the faculty and staff has recommended that we allocate resources to reduce the tuition differential to \$2,700 per year. The Clark Honors College is one of the top 10 honors colleges in the country, and this reduction in the differential tuition level will make it easier to recruit to the university high-achieving students from Oregon and around the nation.

My detailed tuition and fee recommendation can be found in this packet as Exhibit A to your resolution.

I appreciate your thoughtful consideration of this proposal and look forward to a discussion at our upcoming meeting.








### **Tuition and Fees for Nonresidents**



AAU Publics 2017-18 Tuition and Fees Nonresident Full-time Undergraduate





PAC-12 Publics 2017-18 Tuition and Fees Resident Full-time Undergraduate






### Comparison of Faculty per 1,000 Students



Note: The ratio of faculty to students is based on faculty FTE to student FTE. Source: IPEDS Human Resources and Enrollment (FY2016).


### Comparison of Staffing per 1,000 Students

Whereas, the Board has authority to establish policies for the organization, administration and development of the university which, to the extent set forth in those policies, shall have the force of law and may be enforced through university procedures that include an opportunity for appeal and in any court of competent jurisdiction; and,

- 1. RESOLVED, that the AY18-19 tuition and mandatory fee schedule attached hereto as Exhibit A is adopted;
- 2. FURTHER RESOLVED, that the AY18-19 Tuition and Fee Policy Book attached hereto as Exhibit B is adopted effective July 1, 2018 and shall repeal, supersede and replace all University of Oregon rules and policies related to subject matters addressed in the Policies therein, except as determined by the President; and
- 3. FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President, or his designee(s), may take all actions necessary to implement and enforce AY2018-19 tuition and fees and associated Policies.

#### **Mandatory Enrollment Fees**

A fee is a mandatory enrollment fee if it is required to be paid as a condition of enrollment in the University by every enrolled student. In determining mandatory enrollment fees for undergraduate students who are enrolled in a degree program and are qualified to pay tuition:

- (1) The Board of Trustees may not increase the total of tuition and mandatory enrollment fees by more than five percent annually unless the board first receives approval from:
  - a) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission; or
  - b) The Legislative Assembly.
- (2) The Board of Trustees shall attempt to limit annual increases in tuition and mandatory enrollment fees for undergraduate students who are enrolled in a degree program and have established residency in Oregon to a percentage that is not greater than the percentage increase in the Higher Education Price Index, as compiled by the Commonfund Institute.

The Board of Trustees may not delegate authority to determine mandatory enrollment fees for undergraduate students who are enrolled in a degree program and are qualified to pay tuition. For Academic Year 2017-182018-19, mandatory enrollment fees are the Building, Health Service, Incidental, Recreation Center and Student Union Fees. The University has the option of assessing mandatory enrollment fees during the summer session at rates comparable to those assessed in the academic year.

 Building Fee: The Building Fee is used to fund the construction and provide debt service for capital projects, primarily those associated with student centers, health centers, and recreational facilities.

- Incidental Fee: Incidental Fee recommendations for Academic Year 2017-18 were approved by student committees and forwarded to the President of the University for endorsement in accordance with UO Policy 580.010.0080-90. Students enrolled in off-campus programs (OIMB and Portland only) are assessed 50% of the Incidental fee.
- **Health Services Fee:** The Health Service Fee is used to support student health and counseling services. Students enrolled in the UO Portland programs use the Portland State University Student Health Center, and pay the same Health Service Fee as PSU students.
- Recreation Center Fees <u>and</u> -Student Union Fee: The Recreation Center Fees and the Student Union Fee are used to fund the construction, debt service, maintenance, and operation costs of the student centers. The Recreation Center Fees and the Student Union Fee are not charged to students enrolled in the University's Portland programs.
- Technology Fee: The Technology Fee helps the university make important investments to maintain and improve the core infrastructure our technology relies on and stay abreast of rapidly changing technological advances.
- Off-Campus Fee Structure: Students enrolled at the Eugene campus are required to pay all mandatory fees. Students enrolled at the Portland or Charleston campuses or at an off-campus site do not pay the Recreation Center fees or the EMU fee, and they pay 50% of the Incidental fee. Students in Portland are required to pay PSU's Health Service fee and students at the Charleston campus pay UO's Health Service fee. Students at an off-campus site do not pay the Health Service fee.

The Graduate School administers the graduate application fee waiver program. Applicants may request a waiver as part of the online application for Graduate School admission.

#### Post-baccalaureate, Non-graduate Student Classification

A holder of an accredited baccalaureate degree who has not been admitted to a graduate degree program and who submits an official application for admission to pursue a second baccalaureate degree or enroll in course work not to be used for credit toward a graduate degree is called a *post-post-baccalaureate*, *non-graduate student* and is assessed tuition at undergraduate rates. Baccalaureate degree holders who are not admitted to *post-post-baccalaureate*, non-graduate status will be assessed graduate tuition rates.

Students who are admitted to a graduate certificate program are not eligible for the post-post-baccalaureate, non-graduate student status. Graduate tuition rates apply.

#### **The UO Global Health Initiative**

#### Overview:

The campus-wide, student-driven and faculty-led Global Health Initiative at UO represents an interdisciplinary community with a passion for research and teaching in global health. Initially responding to demand from the UO Students for Global Health group, a core collective of interdisciplinary faculty began planning for a research hub and curricular focus in Global Health at UO in 2013. Actively building our program over the past five years, we inaugurated the UO Center for Global Health (CGH; with seed funding from the Global Studies Institute) in 2015 and launched a new Global Health minor in the College of Arts and Sciences in Fall 2017. Drawing on our strengths as a liberal arts institution, our research and teaching is inherently interdisciplinary, tied to our mission to engage in critical inquiry with an aim of improving human health and well-being for marginalized communities in the US and around the world. UO faculty research related to global health focuses on topics such as: racial/ethnic disparities in US health; evolutionary medicine; ethical issues around human genomics; illness narratives and diagnostic systems; medical experimentation in Africa; and, global mental health challenges.

#### Background:

Global Health is in increasing demand as an undergraduate and graduate field of study across the US, with over 80% of the AAU universities currently offering undergraduate minors or majors in Global Health-related fields. This growth reflects a number of trends, in particular, student demand for competency-based higher education that prepares them for real-world careers. Global Health offers an opportunity for universities to support interdisciplinary, international scholarship and to align with the increasing globalization of higher education.

#### Interdisciplinary Focus:

University programs in Global Health are by necessity interdisciplinary and this is the basis of our program at UO, which draws on our strength as a liberal arts institution. The UO Global Health program is different from that at most other universities in that ours is not driven by a school or department of public health and epidemiology. Research and teaching in Global Health at UO focuses on topics such as: the molecular biology of infectious disease; the health consequences of global climate change; development and health economics; anthropological studies of global mental illness, suffering, and care; epidemiological research on racial and ethnic disparities in health; and humanitarian interventions to global crises such as war, famine, and violence. Drawing from existing courses, active research programs, and ongoing engagements with local communities and institutions around the world, we are building a foundation for a distinctive Global Health program at the University of Oregon.

#### Curriculum:

Since its launch in Fall 2017, the Global Health minor has enrolled nearly 50 students through a competitive application process. The two required courses for the minor are INTL 340, Global Health and Development, and a 400-level faculty-supervised independent field experiential or internship course; students also choose elective courses in Global Health from the Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, and Humanities. By taking courses from across the disciplines, Global Health students are exposed to different approaches for studying and addressing health inequalities through research, programs, policy, and practice. Our Global Health program prepares students for careers in public health and medicine, nursing and allied health fields, as well as graduate study in health-related research fields.






